Neighborhood University of Greater **West Chester**

West Goshen Township, in conjuction with area townships, is launching a citizen's education program, Neighborhood University of Greater West Chester, which will provide area residents with the necessary tools and knowledge to better advocate for their community.

Being planned are twelve, 2-hour, weekly sessions facilitated by local, county, and state government officials: area business professionals; and experienced leaders who will cover topics ranging from the structure of Pennsylvania local government, area history, to local government functions including fire, police, and emergency management. Tours of local public facilities will be provided to increase awareness of available municipal services and resources.

Restrictions Still ON

As of this writing (June 27), Chester County along with other southern counties in the state are still at a Drought Emergency status, which mean that activities involving water are still restricted. See last issue of newsletter on website or call Township at 610.696.5266 for details.

Groundwater levels and reservoirs are improving due to above normal rain precipitation in April, May and, June. However, at this time of the year, groundwater levels normally decrease due to the consumption of water by vegetation and evaporation by the hot weather conditions. Therefore, it would not take an especially long period of below-normal rainfall and above-normal temperatures for water shortages to develop later this summer and fall. *

WEEDS

Township ordinance prohibits the growth of ragweed or other harmful weeds, plants, or growth to exceed 12". Present and absent landowners are responsible for maintaining proper levels and can be fined if they do not do so. Ragweed is identified as a harmful plant because it is the principal cause of hay fever in this region. During August and September, when it flowers, each flower produces huge quantities of very light pollen that, when caught by the wind, can travel in excess of 100 miles. *

Discard HHW items at the collections sites listed below. This disposal is offered at no charge to residents. Materials should be left in their original containers and not mixed with other substances. Never dispose of HHW items in the trash, down the sink, in storm drains, or on the ground.

False Automated Fire Alarms

Checklist to Reduce False Alarms

Once a month in industrial settings and once a year in residential settings, the detectors should be cleaned. After receiving instructions from your alarm agent, this cleaning can often be completed by maintenance workers or household members. Turn the system off prior to cleaning and back on when done.

Non-automated smoke detectors also benefit from periodic cleaning: Open detector's case and gently vacuum with a soft brush attachment. If the detector does not open, vacuum over the sensing slots.

Smoke detectors have a life of about 10 years, even those connected to electrical systems. Replacement of old detectors will decrease the likelihood of alarm being activated due to false readings.

When planning structural alteration or major construction work, contact your fire alarm agent to receive instructions before work commences. Make sure maintenance workers or contractors know where fire alarm panel and cabling are located.

Do not run equipment that emits dust or fumes near a detector. If this work cannot be done elsewhere, place a plastic bag over the detector during the activity and promptly remove it when done.

Relocate smoke detectors from where smoke or steam is regularly present (near toasters or showers).

Educate household members or employees.

pproximately 90% of the automated fire alarms that are activated in West Goshen Township are false. With an annual average of 41 automated fire alarms in the Township, this rate translates into 37 fire truck and personnel responses that could have been avoided.

Fortunately the cause of most fire alarms is not fire, but are accidental (somebody bumping into a fire alarm device, a worker spray-paint-

ing, sawing/sanding wood, or welding too close to a detector), incidental (dust, insects, or water in the detector), or mechanical (installation of a new system, an electrical storm, or faulty wiring).



An ionization alarm monitors the electrical charge of particles. When particles enter the sensing chamber, they change the electrical balance of the air. When the charge reaches a certain level, the alarm horn sounds. Whereas, photoelectric detectors have a beam of light and a light sensor in its sensing chamber. When the intensity of light diminishes to a certain level, the alarms sounds.

The following activities have activated automated smoke alarms: build up of dust, insects, and spider webs in the detector; dust generated by floor buffers and concrete saws; vapors from cutting torch and soldering; burning incense and food; hair and air freshener sprays; water from ceiling leak; and steam from opened bag of popcorn and over-cooked microwaved food.

Consequences of Fire Alarms

Delays in Evacuation –

Repeated false alarms tend to reduce occupants' reaction time, which is critical during a genuine fire emergency.

Community Impact –
A call to a false alarm
will jeopardize the
response time to a second

alarm, because equipment and personnel from a station further away will be used to respond to the second alarm.

Volunteer Firefighter Impact – In the case of a false fire alarm, a volunteer firefighter loses at least one hour of work, sleep, or family/personal time responding to such a call. In addition, there is no requirement that employers pay volunteer firefighters for time taken off to respond to a call.

Smoke detectors do save lives — please use them responsibly. ★

Cigarettes: Part II

In the last issue of the Township newsletter, we asked smokers to take one small step towards environmentally friendly smoking by tamping out cigarettes prior to tossing them. In this issue, we are raising the bar and asking smokers to take the next step: PLACE the cigarette in a container.

Litter

Smokers who litter give a bad name to all smokers and make non-smoking activists even more dedicated to (and successful in) increasing smoking bans and raising taxes. Several universities have recently banned smoking on campuses not because of health issues, but because of litter issues. They argued that the number of hours spent by grounds maintenance and landscape staff picking up cigarette butts was not cost-effective use of their staff. In these scenarios, considerate smokers lost out because of their littering counterparts.

The Filter

The cigarette filter is a plastic (cellulose acetate) that some claim degrades in a year, other studies indicate 12 years, and still others state never. Regardless of the time frame, it is a source of trash. In a recent nationwide coastal clean-up project, cigarette butts were 20% of the material collected. The next most frequently collected category of trash made up less than 7% of the trash.

Do these results indicate that smokers are more inclined to take vacations at the ocean or on the bays? No, they confirm what environmentalists have been cautioning: what gets thrown onto an urban/suburban street or parking lot is carried by rainwater or wind into a stormwater system, which releases its contents, into streams and creeks that flow to oceans and bays.

No Throw

You are having a smoke, and it's time to enter the apartment building, restaurant, vehicle, building, etc. You are tamping out the cigarette (good!) and (new behavior) reaching into your purse, shirt pocket, or pants pocket and pulling out an empty plastic film container, a cigarette tube, or portable ashtray and PLACING the cigarette in it.

Or, you are in your car and done with the cig' and let's face it, vehicle ashtrays are a no-win design. They do not hold much and are snapped in so tightly that it is impossible to disengage the tray without the contents spraying out all over. Do not toss cigarette, instead PLACE it in a container (see below).

Container Options

A "cigarette tube" looks like a pen with a clip. This device fits one cigarette and extinguishes it in seconds by shutting out oxygen. for vehicle or boat, there is a container that eliminates the need to tamp out and the need to throw out. The container sits firmly in a cup holder and can be found on www.splashtray.com or 1.229.227.0870.

Businesses, apartment complexes, schools, and buildings that ban indoor smoking can help out by placing userand cleaner- friendly cigarette butt containers near to where smokers gather or at building-entry points. Check out the options at www.buttstop.com or call 1.800.653.1222.
